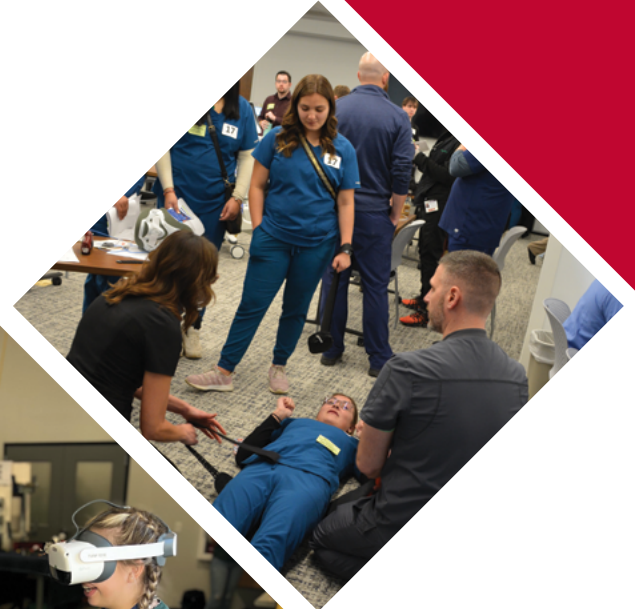

West Michigan Works! is committed to creating a diverse and qualified workforce for West Michigan.

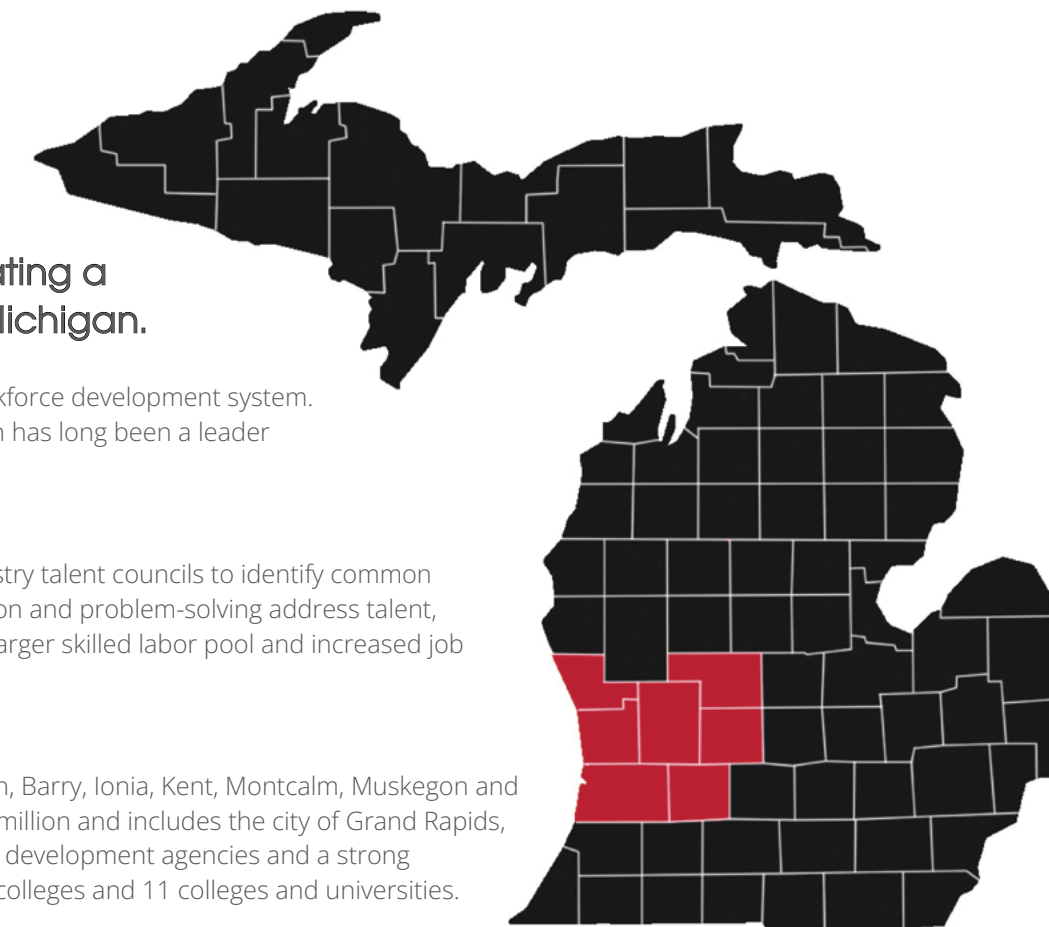
West Michigan Works! is one of 16 agencies within Michigan's workforce development system. Having created the first integrated system in the country, Michigan has long been a leader among the nation's workforce systems.

PRINCIPLES

We rely on labor market data and input from employers and industry talent councils to identify common skill gaps, training needs and industry trends. Regional collaboration and problem-solving address talent, curriculum and advocacy issues on a broader level, resulting in a larger skilled labor pool and increased job placements.

DEMOGRAPHICS

West Michigan Works! serves employers and job seekers in Allegan, Barry, Ionia, Kent, Montcalm, Muskegon and Ottawa counties. The region has a population base of nearly 1.45 million and includes the city of Grand Rapids, the second largest city in the state. It is home to several economic development agencies and a strong network of educational institutions: seven ISDs, three community colleges and 11 colleges and universities.



IMPACT AWARDS

Michigan Works! Impact Awards honor those who have fueled the economy by creating jobs and developing talent in their communities.

Shelondrea Johnson | Hackley Community Care

Shelondrea Johnson's more than 10-year career in health care has given her experience in geriatrics, autism care, and mental health. Currently, she works as an Integrated Health Services Phone Specialist at Hackley Community Care, where her commitment to helping others shines through.

Her upbringing -- living with an ailing mother and later being raised by her supportive grandparents -- has instilled in her purpose and resilience. Shelondrea is a single mother facing the grief of losing of a child due to complications at birth, her grandparents and, more recently, her mother. Despite this, she is determined to support her two children.

Shelondrea finds balance and community at Christ Temple Apostolic, where she leads the youth group. Her passion for helping others fuels her ambition to further her health care career, particularly in supporting individuals with disabilities.

Shelondrea was recently in a car accident that resulted in financial, medical and transportation challenges. At the same time, she needed to recertify her Medical Assistant license. Knowing she needed help, Shelondrea reached out to West Michigan Works! Retention Solutions Network. As a member of RSN, Hackley Community Care provides timely, personalized success coach support to staff overcoming difficulties that could keep them from maintaining employment.

This support helped Shelondrea once again prove her ability to overcome the hardest obstacles. Her coach helped her secure WMW! resources for transportation, training to recertify her Medical Assistant license and financial planning. Plus, she connected to community resources for school supplies and a mentorship program for her oldest daughter.

Shelondrea's story is one of strength and perseverance, and WMW! proudly supports her ongoing journey. We recognize Hackley Community Care for empowering their staff to overcome barriers, support their families and deliver quality health care.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

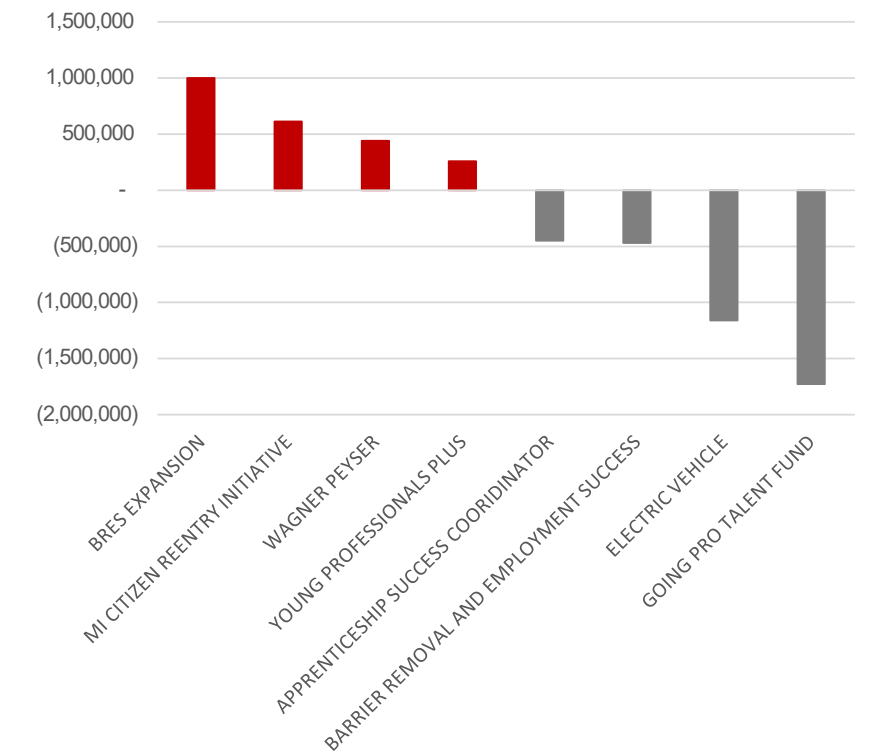
West Michigan Works! (WMW!) operated 58 programs under 95 grants during the year ending September 30, 2024. Each grant dictated the population to be served, how the funding could be used and the time frame in which the funding needed to be spent.

WMW! was awarded \$43,950,820 during the year ending September 30, 2024, a decrease of \$3,257,868 from the previous year. During this time period, we utilized \$48,260,640 of new and carried over awards.

SIGNIFICANT INCREASES/DECREASES IN FUNDING

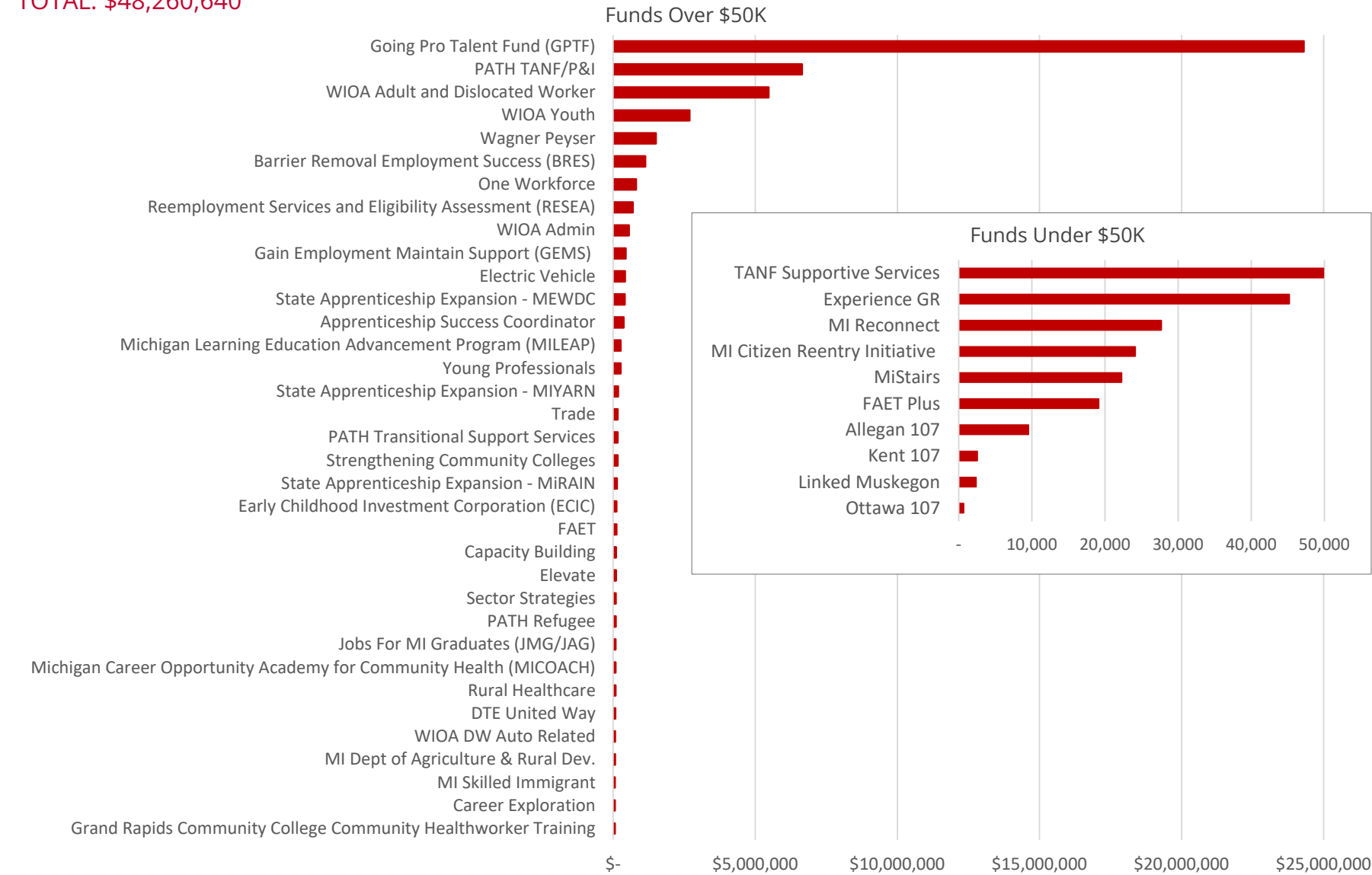
The state awarded several new grants in the year ending September 30, 2024, including Barrier Removal and Employment Success Expansion for \$1,000,000, Michigan Citizen Reentry Initiative for \$613,000, and Young Professionals Plus for \$257,235. The funding for Wagner Peyser also increased over the prior year. The overall reduction in funding is mainly due to awards in the prior year that have not repeated, including Apprenticeship Success Coordinator and Electric Vehicle Talent Action Team. Going Pro Talent Fund and BRES funding also decreased during the year ending September 30, 2024.

EARNED INCOME BY PROGRAM FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2024

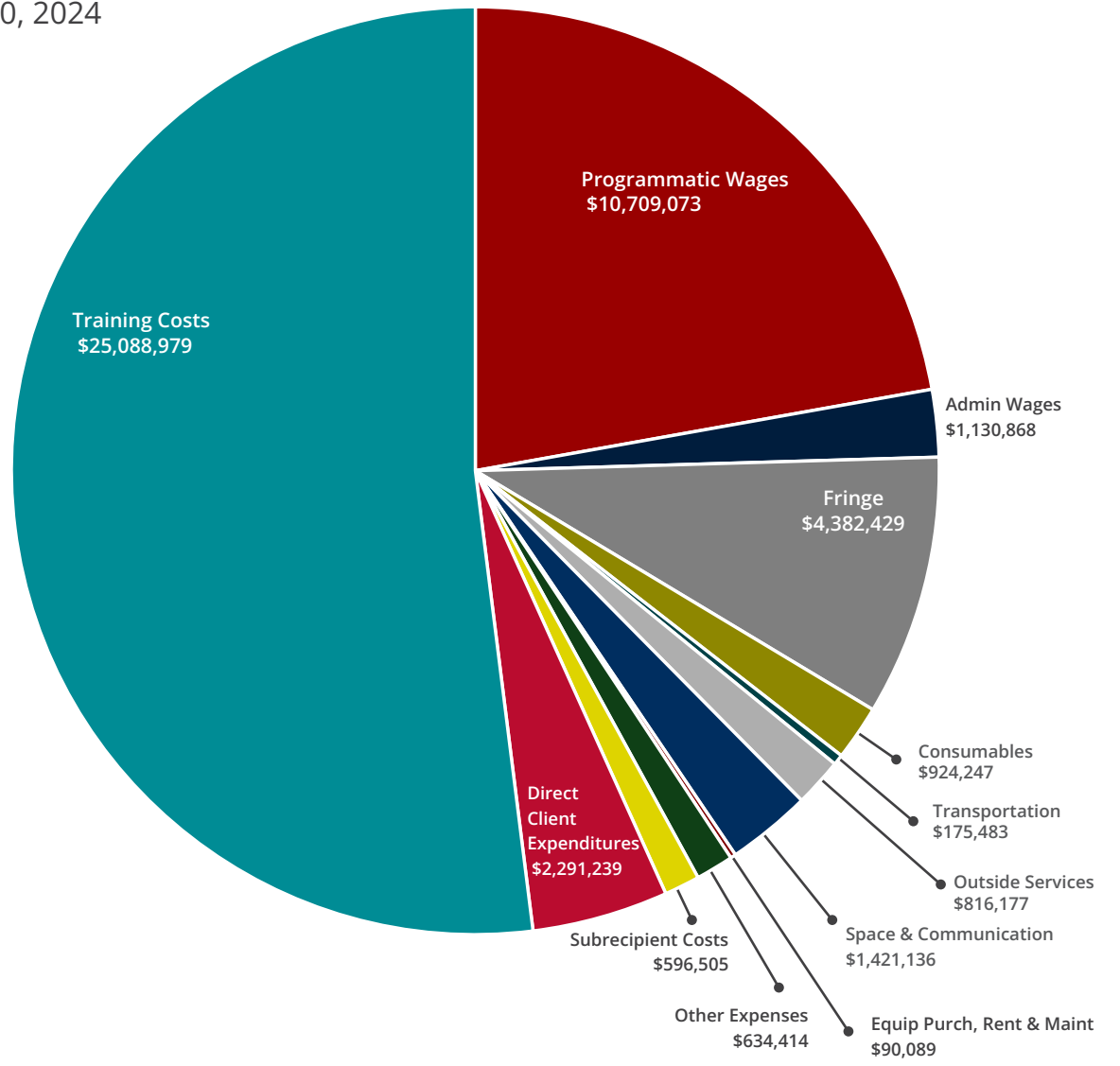

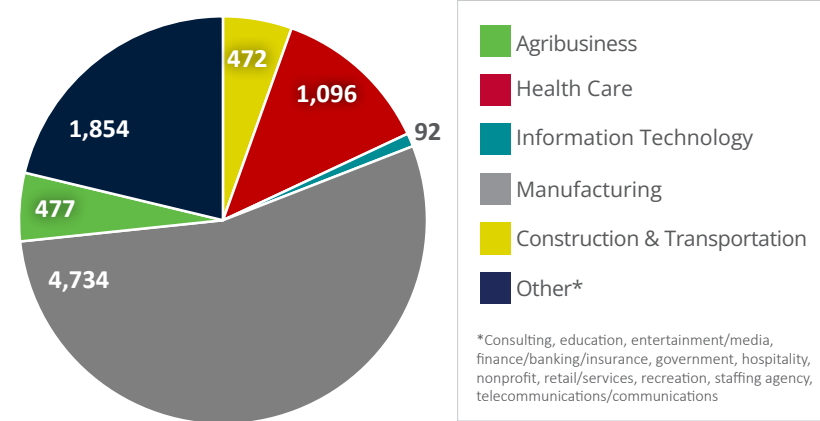

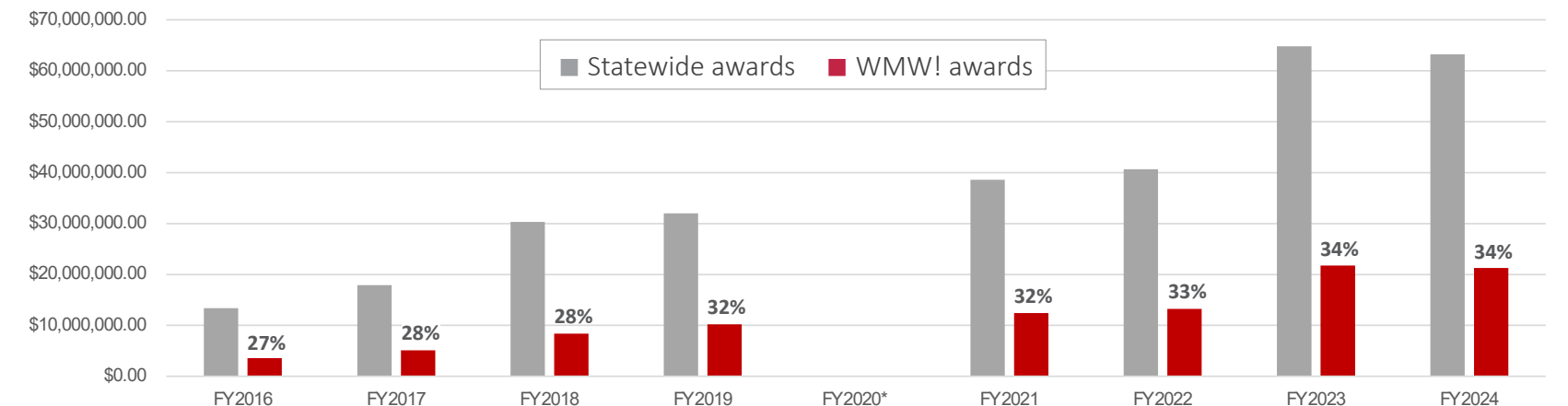
